

After bushfires, floods and a pandemic – it's time to say "thanks" to VICSES volunteers



- Wear Orange Wednesday (WOW Day) is on Wednesday 20th May, 2020
- It's the national day of recognition to say 'thank you' to SES volunteers. Bravely, members have put on their orange uniforms and helped during major bushfires, numerous storm systems and then a pandemic.
- In the past 12 months, VICSES volunteers have responded to 35,000 requests for assistance (that's an average of 100+ every single day). 2019/20 is likely to be the 2nd busiest year in VICSES history in terms of the number of call outs.
- The busiest units in that time period were **Malvern** (1,712 incidents), **Emerald** (1,336 incidents) and **Frankston** (1,176 incidents).
- VICSES is also the largest provider of road rescue in Victoria.
- Victorians are encouraged to get their workplaces, families, and friends involved in WOW Day celebrations by wearing orange and posting a photo to social media using the hashtags
 #WOWDay and #ThankYouSES.



- Landmarks across Victoria will also be **lighting up bright orange**, including the MCG, AAMI Park, Melbourne Town Hall, Bolte Bridge, Soundtube, Arts Centre and Melbourne Eye.
- Workplaces can organise orange themed work meetings, even if working remotely with an SES themed Zoom background available on the VICSES website.

- Malvern unit volunteer Stuart Cronin epitomises the community-first attitude of our volunteers:
 - He was deployed as part of a taskforce to East Gippsland to support the bushfire effort in January working in Cann River.
 - When he returned, he was part of the response to 'Skylight Sunday' when the Malvern Unit received over 1,000 calls for assistance in a single day as a large hail storm lashed Glen Iris, Malvern and Camberwell.
