It's a pleasure to welcome you to the third edition of Community Matters for 2023.

irstly, I would like to congratulate the remarkable VICSES volunteers from South Barwon and Bannockburn Units who participated in the 2023 Australasian Rescue Challenge in Adelaide. Taking home the award for 'Best Performed SES Team' is a wonderful accomplishment, and one that recognises the time and energy committed from each and every member involved.

Since the last edition of Community Matters, the 2023-2024 Victorian Budget was delivered, providing continued investment into VICSES. This included more than \$15 million towards 35 new Heavy Rescue Trucks, and more than \$26 million towards rebuilding the flood affected Rochester and Heathcote CFA and VICSES Units. Bannockburn and Kilmore will see new VICSES facilities, and additional works will be undertaken for the Frankston VICSES satellite facility in Skye as part of the Government's \$34.2 million commitment to redevelop local emergency services facilities,



which also included \$500,000 to progress planning for a future Footscray VICSES facility. As always, we are proud to support our volunteers with better facilities and equipment to help keep Victoria safe during major weather events and other emergencies.

Over the past several months, I was pleased to hear that a number of VICSES units completed visits to the Emergency Services Telecommunication Authority facility at Williams Landing. It is these behind the scenes experiences that equip and strengthen our emergency services sector, demonstrating our #WeWorkAsOne approach to emergencies.

As we enter the second half of 2023, the warmer weather will bring increased risk for our emergency services. From Murrayville to Mallacoota, I sincerely thank all VICSES volunteers for always being there when the community needs you most.

## Australasian Rescue Challenge

And the Australasian Rescue Challenge (ARC) Directors' Shield for Best Performed SES Team goes to... our very own **VICSES South Barwon** and **Bannockburn Units!** 

big congratulations to Team Leader Caroline Taylor, Josh Hutton, Lisa Keys, Adrian Van Doren, Blake Shawcross and Andrew Kuppen – who have done their communities and the service proud.

From 29 June to 2 July, their skills were put to the test in Adelaide alongside 300 personnel from

23 teams across Australia, England, Hong Kong, New Zealand, Singapore and the United Kingdom.

Based on real emergency incident scenarios, ARC 2023 enabled the dedicated personnel to demonstrate their skills, techniques, and knowledge through a range of road crash

rescue challenges. Participants also attended several functions where they learnt from subject matter experts and experienced rescue instructors from around the world.

"Our VICSES team completed three simulated road crash rescue scenarios – controlled, timecritical, and entrapped. With each evolution the team increased in confidence, which was evident with each patient being extricated from the vehicles. VICSES was one of only a few teams that managed to remove all patients from the vehicles in the allotted timeframe of thirty minutes," said Operations Officer – Capability Improvement, Gerry Sheridan, who also attended the event.

Team medic and South Barwon Deputy Controller, Lisa Keys said the event was "really well organised and a lot of fun. You meet heaps of different likeminded people, make friends that return year-after-year, and get to bounce ideas off each other. It's beneficial to see what's up and



coming in the industry and get a chance to put it into practice."

"It's given me a good opportunity to become a more effective and efficient operator, increasing my confidence in my abilities so when I do go out on the road, I know what I can achieve. I'm always proud to put the orange on and represent our service whether it's in a competition or out on a job," continued Lisa.

The challenge is hosted annually by the Australasian Road Rescue Organisation, and engagement from teams across Australasia is intended to promote shared knowledge, a consistent approach, and to build ongoing relationships between emergency management agencies.

Once again, well done to our incredibly skilled VICSES team.

## **VICSES** women Ready 2 Lead

Did you know that extreme weather and natural disasters disproportionately impact women?

ccording to data collected by the United Nations<sup>1</sup>, women are societally, culturally, and economically most at risk during extreme weather and natural disasters. Understanding the different needs and experiences of women of all ages is critical, as is actively seeking their input and leadership moving forward.

VICSES members recently took part in Lifesaving Victoria's 'Ready 2 Lead' program, which included a cohort of 47 women from across our emergency management sector. Over April-June, structured sessions both in-person and online provided an opportunity

for participants to hear from senior leaders in our sector on a broad range of topics, including building resilience to personal setbacks, and focusing on finding networks of support.

VICSES Chief Executive Officer Stephen Griffin and Chief Officer Operations Tim Wiebusch also attended to listen and learn from the participants, which offered an important opportunity to reflect on, and champion equality across the organisation.

VICSES San Remo Unit Controller. Mandy Chancellor, said there were so many aspects of the program "they got right".





The course was run by a group of amazing women wbo guided, supported, advised, and mentored each one of us at a level which made us feel valued and inspired. The structure and delivery of this course surpasses any other leadersbip program I bave been involved in" said Mandy.

VICSES Rosedale Unit Deputy Controller, Samantha Nott was especially moved by the panel's open and honest discussion of the challenges to good mental health that are presented by managing a large team or organisation.

"I think the biggest takeaway I had was about work life balance. I always thought I was bad at achieving this, but the panel said that there is no balance, you learn to blend. I learned that this was normal, not to set expectations against yourself, but to work with what you could reasonably be expected to achieve," said Samantha.

For Mandy, "the course may have finished, but the friends I made and the relationships established grow stronger. The wisdom I gained from the inspiring women involved in the program has made me confident, equipped, and excited for the next part of my leadership journey."

"This is a course that should be mandatory for women in leadership in any industry, not just emergency services. I look forward to continuing my relationship with Ready 2 Lead and thank them for their commitment to women in leadership," continued Mandy. ■

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

Carrum Indigenous Nursery volunteers Lesley and Jason Smart jumped at the rare opportunity, collecting and identifying 100 viable seeds from within the Banksia, ensuring its story will continue for many centuries to come.

"We were so thrilled that the volunteers took the time to call us and give us the opportunity to collect the seed pods," said Lesley.

"Even if we only had one seedling to take, that would still guarantee this beautiful old tree's history lives on."

## Flood recovery in the Goulburn Valley

ore than nine months after the floodwater residing in communities along the Goulburn River still live with the devastating impacts of flooding - some spending winter living in caravans in their driveways while their homes remain uninhabitable from flood damage and unsettled insurance claims.

Local governments and recovery agencies continue to work with community members in various stages of recovery some still experiencing trauma, and some rapidly recovering, improving preparedness for future emergencies.

Disaster recovery is not a fast process, and while we reset, refresh, and get ready for the next emergency, VICSES community engagement teams work alongside community members in the grey areas between recovery and preparedness.

From big flashy expos bringing family fun back into flood affected communities, emotional community meetings about the difficult recovery process, and updating Local Flood Guides, to intensive cultural work teaching refugees about their local flood risk and when to call Triple Zero 000, 132 500, or the VicEmergency Hotline for warnings in other languages on 1800 226 226.

At least six Goulburn Valley communities are creating Community Emergency Planning Committees, to develop formal community plans for coordinated community readiness and response to emergencies without 100% reliance on emergency services - particularly in locations that are isolated or unreachable where resilience is paramount.

We will continue to work with communities in the Goulburn Valley to reduce the impacts of further flood events, well into the future. ■






With recruitment high on the agenda. Rebecca is hoping to capitalise on diversity to increase membership.

Sessions demonstrated the different event types and questioning techniques used by operators to extract relevant information and enable an appropriate response.



# Local Flood Guide Enhancement Project

In response to significant flood events in 2010 and 2011, Local Flood Guides (LFGs) were developed for at-risk communities.

ith over 140 LFGs currently in circulation and 30 more in

development, these guides are essential tools for engaging communities and raising awareness about flood risks. They also provide crucial guidance for effective preparation and response during flood emergencies.

To improve the accessibility and understanding of the LFGs, a comprehensive review has been considered necessary. The project has received support through grant funding secured from the Risk and Resilience Grants Program, and is due to be completed by February 2024, with all existing LFGs being updated to a new template.

Central to the initiative is extensive community consultation, ensuring that the LFGs cater to diverse audiences. The process will also integrate current best practices for effective communication.

To assist in making informed recommendations and promoting wide acceptance of the proposed changes, a working group has been formed comprising staff and volunteers with diverse expertise, perspectives, and skills in the use of LFGs. The group is instrumental in the project's success.

Assets challenged the safe design of the filling system with the manufacturer and referred the concerns to the **Australian Maritime Safety Authority** (AMSA). They agreed the design needed to change, and all Britton boat fuel systems have been upgraded with improved ventilation, fuel surge protectors and a fuel whistle.
