I would like to begin by thanking those VICSES members who provided critical support to impacted communities during the severe storms which occurred on 13 February 2024.

his event saw significant damage to trees, buildings, and essential infrastructure, and sadly the loss of one life. The support you have provided to those in need across the state during this event and the severe weather events that followed has been phenomenal, showcasing the integral role that VICSES plays as part of our state's emergency services.

The storm event on 13
February followed a busy summer period, with storms and flooding experienced throughout December 2023 and into January 2024. VICSES volunteers continued to provide significant support to local communities during these challenges and also contributed to interstate deployments to storm affected communities in Queensland.

On 10 January I joined the Australian Prime Minister, Hon. Anthony Albanese MP and the Victorian Deputy Premier, the Hon. Ben Carroll MP at the Victoria



State Control Centre, to be briefed on the severe weather impacts during this period and our state-wide response. It was terrific to meet with key leaders and members in our sector and acknowledge the incredible efforts by VICSES and our emergency service agencies during this time.

On 29 December I was also pleased to attend one of the fantastic Driver Reviver sites, alongside the Minister for Roads and Road Safety, the Hon. Melissa Horne MP, to view one of the six new Driver Reviver vans in-person ahead of the New Year public holiday.

Driver Reviver is an incredibly important road safety initiative led by volunteers. A big thank you to those VICSES volunteers who gave up their time to support 21 activated Driver Reviver sites during this period.

Once again, thank you all for your continued contributions and dedication to emergency services across Victoria and interstate. I know the upcoming Easter period can be another busy season and I hope you are all able to take some time to rest and relax over the coming weeks.

Hello everyone,

s my first CEO message for Community Matters, I am delighted to launch this edition and share the significant contributions of our VICSES members across the state over what has been a particularly busy period.

On Tuesday 13 February we saw severe storms impact communities across Victoria, causing widespread damage and power outages. During this period our volunteers have responded to almost 7,000 requests for assistance (RFAs), including over 4,990 trees down and over 907 instances of building damage. Monash Unit has received significant demand, responding to over 1,000 RFAs. In addition, our Emerald Unit received 568 RFAs while our Greater Dandenong Unit received 372. Thank you to all our members who have provided crucial assistance for our local communities during this time.

Victoria experienced heavy rainfall and thunderstorms over Christmas, with our volunteers responding to over 1,500 requests for assistance between 24-27 December 2023. Soon after, our communities were impacted from 7 January 2024, with widespread flooding and storm damage. During this period our volunteers responded to over 1,800 requests for assistance – an incredible effort, and a testament to the dedication of our people both on-the-ground, as part of Incident Management, Regional and State Teams. You can read more about our flood and storm response on pages 4-7.

In addition to our response here in Victoria, our members have also deployed interstate to Queensland to support those affected by severe storms and Tropical Cyclone Kirrily. Our members have received high-praise from our Queensland-counterparts for their efforts, and you can read more on pages 22-23.

I would like to congratulate our 2024 Emergency Service Medal recipient, Sue Sheldrick, whose distinguished service has been recognised in this year's Australia Day Honours. During Sue's 14 years as a Community Resilience Coordinator with VICSES, Sue has demonstrated an outstanding commitment in emergency management to VICSES operations, training, community education and engagement. In January, I was thrilled to be able to join with our members for the Force of Nature – The Dry 2 movie premiere, which featured our volunteers as part of a land search and rescue. You can view the photos from the red carpet on page 10.

I have greatly admired the contributions and achievements of our members over my first months with VICSES, in particular those who have given up time with loved ones to help those in need over the summer holiday period.

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During December 2023 and January 2024 Victoria was hit by two severe weather events, causing widespread flooding, and certainly dampening the holiday season.



ver the Christmas period in December 2023, a Severe Weather Warning was issued for heavy rainfall, flooding, large hail, and damaging winds. As communities were impacted, our volunteers were called away from their Christmas celebrations to support those in need, responding to over 1,500 requests for assistance (RFAs) across the state.

Coming into the new year, Victorians were impacted once again with heavy rainfall from 7 January, seeing the commencement of another state-wide flood response. Our volunteers responded to over 1,800 RFAs, including 849 for flood-related incidents, 498 for trees down, and 248 for building damage. Our busiest units included Bendigo (201 RFAs), Kilmore (119 RFAs), and Pakenham (83 RFAs).

Flood impacts from this event were widespread and included some properties that were impacted above floor level. The hardest hit areas included Ballarat, Bendigo, Euroa, Kilmore, Rochester, Seymour, and Shepparton.

Several relief centres were opened in impacted areas with VICSES






Creek, which was around 40 metres wide and 70 metres long. The road remained closed with traffic management points in place. An Incident Management Team supported with the operations out of the Ferntree Gully Incident Control Centre, and worked extensively with partner agencies to ensure the area was deemed safe to reopen the road.

We cannot thank the contributions of our members enough during this time, particularly across the boliday season.

The positive feedback received by the community, partner agencies, and government leaders is a testament to the hard work and dedication of our members in keeping our communities safe.



kept safe and up to date with the current situation, warnings were issued via VicEmergency channels around the clock. During the event there were 219 Advice and 4 Community Information messages issued, along with 77 Watch and Act (including 3 Warnings for the landslide event), and 17 Emergency Warnings.

Incident Control Points, Incident Control Centres, Regional Control Centres, and the State Control Centre were all activated to support more than 50% of the state which had been impacted.

A major incident that occurred on 9 January due to the heavy rainfall included a landslide at Mount Dandenong Tourist Road in Ferny







SUMMER FLOOD AND STORM RESPONSE

Severe storms draw dedicated response from VICSES members


On Tuesday 13 February a Severe Thunderstorm Warning was issued for parts of the state, accompanied by Catastrophic and Extreme Fire Danger Ratings due to hot and windy conditions.

amaging winds and large hailstones first impacted areas including Geelong and Bendigo. The cells that impacted the west of the state then built in momentum as they crossed Port Phillip Bay seeing the Eastern and South Eastern suburbs of Melbourne being impacted heavily into Tuesday afternoon. The fast moving storms kept their intensity as they crossed West and South Gippsland later in the evening, seeing

significant damage in our more rural locations such as Mirboo North and Thorpdale.

Storm impacts were widespread, including substantial power outages affecting more than 530,000 customers across the state. This is the most power outages ever recorded in Victoria from a single storm event.

On the ground, our volunteers worked day and night to provide much needed support for



those affected communities, who had been completely devastated by its impacts. From 13 - 25 February, our volunteers responded to almost 7,000 requests for assistance, including over 4,990 trees down, and more than 907 counts of building damage.

Our busiest units included Monash (1,075), Emerald (568), and Greater Dandenong (372). In Gippsland, areas around Mirboo North, Warragul and Thorpdale were hardest hit, with Leongatha Unit seeing the highest number of RFAs in the area (414) followed by Warragul (111) and Bairnsdale (110).

VICSES provided a number of Incident Management Team roles at state, regional, and local tiers, in addition to Divisional and Sector Commanders, Field Operation Vehicle operators, staging area support, taskforces, Community Liaisons Officers, and more.

Many of our units were supported by their local communities, who donated much needed











fuel in the way of food and hydration for those volunteers working around the clock. Thank you for your incredibly generous donations.

Greater Dandenong Unit

The Victorian Premier, Jacinta Allen, and the Minister for Emergency Services, Jaclyn Symes each visited our units and impacted locations in regional and metro areas including Emerald, Mirboo North, Monash and Knox to thank volunteers their contributions.

We are incredibly grateful to all of our VICSES members who played a leading role in our state's response to this event, and acknowledge those volunteers who travelled to support other units and their impacted communities. Our members have once again demonstrated our dedication, skills, leadership, and resilience in working as one to keep our communities safe. Thank you. ■

warded by the Governor-General, the Emergency
Services Medal was instituted in 1999 to recognise distinguished service as a member of an Australian emergency service. It also recognises people who are involved in emergency management, training, or education.

During Sue's 14 years as a Community Resilience Coordinator (CRC) with VICSES, she has demonstrated outstanding commitment in emergency management to VICSES operations, training, community education and engagement.

Sue has been a leader in the training and coordination, as a facilitator, of the multi-agency Public Information Officer training

suite (including warnings, media and community liaison), and the VICSES Community Engagement Facilitator course for more than 14 years.

Community engagement is an important function at VICSES. A community that is well prepared for flood, storms and other emergency situations, can reduce the impacts and lessen the consequences of an emergency, saving lives and property.

This is why Sue's passion is to share her knowledge and experience in operational settings, to coach and mentor staff and volunteers as they support the community in preparedness, response, and recovery messaging during and after emergency events. Sue works closely with Culturally and Linguistically Diverse (CALD) communities and Joint Public Information Committees to ensure that, across the whole agency, our messaging is delivered in a consistent way.

Sue has been a pivotal figure in cultural awareness training at VICSES and more broadly, throughout the sector. Much of the material we use today at VICSES, to support CALD and wider communities, was developed and enhanced by Sue, who has worked to develop and refine the material over several years.

Sue has been a go-to for community engagement and public information personnel around the state, providing ongoing leadership - and mentoring - for volunteers and staff entering the emergency management sector.

Sue has even been honoured before. As the first female Captain of a Country Fire Authority brigade, a street at a Victorian Emergency Training Centre has been named for her.

Sue's will to show up for her community when needed is one of the strongest in the emergency management sector; the Victorian community is unquestionably safer for her tireless work.


This year's International Women's Day theme is Inspire Inclusion, prompting us to reflect on the importance of having women from a diverse array of backgrounds represented here at VICSES.





She said "as a female member joining VICSES at the Greater Dandenong Unit, I wouldn't be completely honest if I said that I had no reservations about joining what I assumed was a male-dominated environment. I had little knowledge or skillset in power tools and wasn't sure how I could assist my community, but I was eager to learn so I tried to approach everything with an open mind.

The leadership team at Greater Dandenong made it known to the entire unit that they were making improvements to become a more genderinclusive unit and myself and other female members were asked for our input. Allowing the women in the unit to be involved in the discussion on change was a powerful declaration that leadership valued its female members."

Some of the changes made to promote a gender inclusive environment involve:

- Actively including women in discussions and decision making around gender inclusive change.
- Feminine hygiene products made available within the unit and on all operational vehicles.
- Private change rooms located near member lockers.
- Women's events held outside the unit.

Michael and the Greater Dandenong Unit leadership team are committed to facilitating an inclusive environment for all members.

He said "a co-located emergency management facility in Keysborough between Greater Dandenong VICSES and Keysborough Country Fire Authority is still the major goal for us to achieve in the short term. This will allow us to include culturally diverse members through provision of facilities such as a prayer space and personal wash facilities. I will continue to work with our elected Members of Parliament and other stakeholders to turn this vision into a reality."

Newly Arrived Australians do the 72 Hour Program

ndertaking my role as a Community Resilience Coordinator with VICSES, in February I joined with 50 newly arrived Australians settled in Kialla, Mooroopna and Shepparton to undertake the 72-Hour Program in Arabic language.

People from Syria and Turkey took time to practice how to call for help on Triple Zero and 132 500, and to hear warnings information in Arabic language on the VicEmergency Hotline, call 1300 226 226.

Participants also took time to understand and plan for emergencies in Australia, including floods and storms, making use of our SES Emergency Grab Bags and Triple Zero Victoria's Arabic Language Factsheets to make sure their families can stay safe and get the help they need, when they need it.

Importantly, participants became familiar with the different kinds of emergency services in Victoria, concepts of volunteerism, and expressed interest in joining their local Shepparton Search and Rescue Squad to help their new communities.

The 72 Hour Program is an 'open source' multi-agency approved preparedness initiative with four simple steps to being ready for emergencies, including an accessible brochure and written plan template.

Monash Unit volunteers provide critical support during storms

Units across Victoria's east were hit hard by a supercell storm event that only lasted around 10-20 minutes, occurring on Tuesday 13 February.

he Monash Unit received the highest demand for support with over 1,000 requests for assistance (RFAs) across five days following the event, and more than 400 on the first night alone. We had three crews out already completing a couple of RFAs when the storm hit, sheltering in vehicles until the first rescue came in. With traffic lights out everywhere, peak hour traffic, no internet SAS or OIMS, flooding and trees down on most major roads, crews went back to basics to navigate



through the chaos to attend multiple rescues. Crews worked late into the night to clear entire trees off major roads. However, the extent of the storm's destruction became more evident the next day with debris everywhere, not to mention the hundreds of RFAs continuing to stream in.

We had close to 40 volunteers from our Unit crewing our six response vehicles on the first night, with multiple crews continuing to turn up daily over the following days.

In total, it is likely more than 75% of the unit assisted in some capacity during this four day event, whether that be on the trucks, at the Incident Control Point (ICP), or supplies and logistics.

The recovery from this storm event locally was a combined multi-agency effort, coordinated by the Monash Unit. We had much needed assistance from other SES units, both locally and from as far as Chiltern, as well as the Country Fire Authority (CFA) crews, Forest Fire Management

Many of our volunteers have committed themselves everyday throughout this storm event, sacrificing work and family obligations to do so. Without this, we would not have been able to respond in the way that we did, and it helped dramatically to have so many members turn out on that first night to gain control of the situation. Not just the members on the trucks, but those who jumped into the ICP and stayed back to prepare chainsaws and equipment to bring some order to the chaos unfolding.

We're very proud with our efforts, in what has become the second largest storm event in our unit's history, having been pushed to the limits but bouncing back each day to serve our community with relentless passion.


The scouts were even able to earn their SES scout badge by the end of the night.

East Gippsland Flood Class Level Review Project

Stage one of the East Gippsland Flood Class Level Review Project went into full-force from 2023.

ast Gippsland Catchment
Management Authority
(EGCMA), East Gippsland Shire
Council (EGSC), and VICSES Gippsland
have worked very hard to review the flood
warning system across the East Gippsland
landscape. Together, we have evaluated
the accuracy and consistency of impacts
felt at Minor, Moderate and Major flood
levels, and adjustments have been made to
line up to the National Standard.

Those involved in the review attended a community pop-up event in Orbost with the region's Driver Reviver van as the central meeting point. This was an opportunity for people who live and farm on the Snowy to come by and ask questions about the changes to the Flood Class Levels.

Communications around these changes will be ongoing for the affected communities in Buchan, Bairnsdale Genoa and Orbost. It will take time for everyone to adjust to the new normal.

Local Flood Guides have been developed to support each of the communities in the associated impacts at each flood class level.

The team continues to work towards the Stage two roll-out, with aspirations to launch in June 2024.

Stage two will consist of new Flood Class Levels being added to several existing East Gippsland gauging stations, in addition to enhancing community preparedness and risk mitigation.



Barwon South West Regional Unit at work across the state

In early January 2024, members of the Barwon South West Regional Unit were deployed to assist with the flood response in north-east Victoria.



nit Controller Mel and Unit Officers Ash and Sarah were sent to Shepparton, forming a team with other VICSES volunteers and staff alongside Country Fire Authority (CFA) volunteers. The team were tasked with door-knocking 300+ residents to provide flood information and check on people's welfare.

The Shepparton community was heavily affected by the floods in 2022, and some of the people the team visited were living in temporary accommodation following damage to their homes during 2022. Many community members were understandably nervous about what would happen as the rivers rose.





It was amazing to see the community get together and support each other" said Unit Controller Mel.

"Residents were so welcoming and greatly appreciated the effort we were taking to visit them", said Unit Officer Ash. "Many expressed relief that this flood wouldn't be as bad (as 2022), and others were totally across the situation, current water levels, and knew all the lingo! We received lovely gestures and offers of water, sunscreen and a rest while walking in the heat".

While the deployment was challenging, the team members agreed that they were fortunate

to play a valuable role in the flood response, and gain an understanding of how resilient the Shepparton community is.

There are eight VICSES Regional Units across the Victoria, with one situated in each Emergency Management Region. These units play an important role alongside operational response units, undertaking incident management roles during emergencies and supporting community engagement activities.

Members assist Ballarat search and rescue operation

n early February, VICSES members supported Victoria Police in the land search for Ballarat East woman Samantha Murphy. Over 200 volunteers from 23 of our units were involved in the search across six days. Units were located in Loddon Mallee, North West Metro, Barwon South and the Grampians area.

The terrain at the search location was arduous, with bushland and sparse shrubbery sloping down into canopied parts that open out on to large paddocks. Volunteers experienced varied weather ranging from hot, dry conditions to being cold and rainy.

Our volunteers were supported by a Forward Operating Vehicle, which relayed operational communications to an Incident Commander on site, in addition to a VICSES staff member based at the Buninyong Police Station, to coordinate with Victoria Police.

This operation was a multi-agency effort, with VICSES volunteers and staff also working together with volunteers from organisations



such as the Country Fire Authority and Search and Rescue Dogs Australia. They were also joined by members of the community who arrived in hundreds to support Victoria Police.

James Boler completes Electrical Vehicle Training interstate

rom 9 – 11 February, James Boler (VICSES Regional Trainer) attended the Everything Electric Australia show in Sydney, undertaking training of the rescue components of electric vehicles (EVs) and their potential hazards.

In Australia there have only been six EV fires, with three of those occurring because the building around them had ignited. This means there are fewer fires involving EVs than those with a traditional combustion engine, which James found surprising. Additionally, 7% of all new cars purchased in Australia in 2023 were EVs – doubling the 3.3% from 2022.

With the fire risk lowered and the number of vehicles on the road doubling, as Victoria's largest road rescue provider, VICSES is likely to come across a road accident before we come across a fire. In fact, most firefighters will never attend an EV fire in their career.

VICSES members deployed to Queensland



VICSES plays an integral role in our emergency response here in Victoria, and at times interstate. Throughout 2023 and into 2024, our members have been deployed to support our partner agencies in Queensland, for those impacted by severe storm and fire events.

n October 2023,
Queensland Fire Emergency
Services (QFES) formally
requested support via the
Victorian Emergency Management
Commissioner for fire strike teams
and Incident Management Teams
(IMT) across four rotations. VICSES
members, including volunteers
and staff, were deployed as
part of a Victorian multi-agency
contingent. In total, VICSES

sent 11 IMT members to support these fire events.

One contingent of VICSES members joined a multi-agency fire IMT which was made up of 50% volunteer members. Most positions were filled by our female members performing key functional IMT roles. One of these members was a volunteer Unit Controller on an IMT accreditation pathway, and her deployment provided her the

valuable final evidence to become the first volunteer VICSES member to achieve Level 3 Operations Officer Accreditation!

Later in December 2023, our support was requested again when Southeast Queensland was impacted by severe storms and flooding. VICSES members were deployed in two taskforces (Alpha and Charlie) as part of a Victorian multi-agency contingent with Country Fire Authority (CFA) members.

The following taskforces were deployed from Victoria to Queensland for this event:

 Taskforce Alpha which consisted of 45 VICSES members (both staff and volunteers) who undertook storm response tasks including safe working at heights and chainsaw roles.

- Taskforce Bravo which compromised of a Command Vehicle and 10 Medium Rescue Trucks. They drove in convoy from Victoria to Queensland.
- Taskforce Charlie which consisted of 27 VICSES members (both staff and volunteers).

VICSES also provided two Jurisdictional Liaison Officers (JLOs) on two rotations to Queensland Fire and Emergency Service (QFES) Headquarters in Brisbane to manage and support the entire Victorian emergency management contingent.

VICSES received high praise from community members in







Queensland for the support VICSES has contributed during this deployment, including the following letter from QFES Acting Commissioner. Steve Smith.

"Queenslanders have faced several extreme weather events in the past six months, with volatile bushfires in the west, unpredictable storms in the south east and two cyclones in the northern parts of the state.

The critical support provided by VICSES to their Queensland colleagues during these difficult times is sincerely appreciated. It is through the strength of our collective efforts and the camaraderie between emergency service colleagues, that we successfully navigated this challenging period and continued to deliver frontline and behind-the-scenes services to those Queensland communities needing assistance.

Thank you also to your families for their support, flexibility and understanding to enable those who deployed interstate to provide additional capacity and give much needed relief to our crews. On behalf of Queensland Fire and Emergency Services, Thank you."

Lastly, in anticipation for Tropical Cyclone Kirrily, VICSES members again lent a hand to QFES. This included four VICSES staff who joined IMTs working out of Mackay, and as a JLO at QFES headquarters in Brisbane.

Thank you to all members who have dedicated time away from family, friends and workplaces to support those affected by severe weather events in Queensland. Your dedication to our community, both locally and interstate is admirable.





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

Navigating the world of Al: Traditional vs generative and everyday applications

Artificial Intelligence (AI) has become an integral part of our daily lives, shaping the way we interact with technology and enhancing various aspects of our routines. Many members have had questions about what AI is and its impacts.

here are two main categories of Al: traditional and generative. Traditional Al relies on predefined rules and structured data to perform specific tasks. This type of AI is excellent for solving well-defined problems and is commonly found in applications like voice assistants. recommendation systems, and image recognition. For instance, when your virtual assistant recognises your voice commands or suggests movies based on your viewing history it is leveraging traditional Al algorithms.

On the other hand, generative Al is more advanced and capable of creating content on its own. Instead of relying on explicit programming, it learns from patterns and generates new content. This

type of Al is making waves in creative fields such as art and music generation. Many of us are familiar with the text-generating application ChatGPT. Another notable example is Microsoft Copilot, a tool that uses generative Al to assist users in the Office 365 space by helping with tasks such as writing, formatting presentations, creating graphs and analysing trends.

Every day we encounter a myriad of Al applications that seamlessly integrate into our routines. Social media platforms utilise Al algorithms to curate personalised content on our feeds, adapting to our preferences and behaviours. E-commerce sites employ recommendation systems to suggest products based on our past purchases and browsing history,

making online shopping a tailored experience.

Smart home devices, from thermostats to security cameras leverage Al for improved automation and customisation. These devices learn our habits and preferences over time, adjusting settings to create a more comfortable and secure environment.

Whether it's the convenience of a voice-activated assistant or the personalised recommendations on your favourite streaming platform, Al has become a ubiquitous presence in our lives. As technology continues to evolve, the integration of both traditional and generative Al promises even more exciting developments, making our interactions with machines more intuitive and adaptive than ever before.
