
Year at a glance

2022-23 marked another extremely busy financial year for our members, seeing some of our states most significant emergency events.

On the back of the 2022 Victorian Floods, flood incidents increased by 130% compared to 2021-22. Our volunteers and staff have contributed extensive hours in support of Victorian communities throughout the year, as well as communities interstate. Here's a wrapup of the 2022-2023 year at a glance!





Snapshot: Operations of significance

JULY 2022

New South Wales (NSW) Deployments

NSW experienced significant rainfall in July, VICSES deployed 72 members to support.

AUGUST 2022

Severe Weather

A strong cold front moved over eastern Victoria, VICSES received approximately 500 requests for assistance.

OCTOBER 2022 - JANUARY 2023

Victorian Statewide Flooding Event

In October 2022, a low-pressure system travelled east over Australia, bringing heavy rainfall and storms. Over 1.3 million sandbags were laid, 372 emergency warnings issued and 147 VICSES units deployed.

JANUARY – FEBRUARY 2023

Western Australia Deployments

Western Australia experienced significant flooding, 18 VICSES volunteers and staff provided Incident Management resources.

MAY 2023

Bus Accident Eynesbury

A truck collided with a bus carrying 45 children in Eynesbury. Two regional command staff members were deployed and 20 volunteers in total.

Earthquake

A 4.0 magnitude earthquake struck 3km deep in the north-western suburb of Sunbury. There were 27,124 felt reports.

Fleeing war and persecution in Sri Lanka, Neil Para, his two young daughters, and his pregnant wife made the perilous boat journey to Australia in 2012.



ventually settling in Ballarat, their bridging visas were revoked after four months - leaving them in limbo. With no right to work, no Medicare, and no study rights, it was the Ballarat community who rallied around the family and paid their bills and rent.

In February 2016 Neil joined VICSES, with very limited English skills and a determination to learn. "It was really hard for me to understand at the beginning but with the support of unit members and trainers, I got through my training" he said.

"Now I'm a Crew Leader! It's a big milestone for me and I'm very proud."

In August, Neil embarked on a 40-day, 1,000km walk from Ballarat to the Prime Minister's office in Sydney to deliver a petition and raise awareness of the 10,000 asylum seekers currently living in uncertainty in Australia. On day 15, VICSES Wodonga Unit even provided an escort into Wodonga!

As Neil arrived in Sydney, his family were granted permanent visas. He credits VICSES Ballarat Unit members with helping him to become part of the community and get through what was an incredibly difficult time. "I never knew about VICSES before I started, but until I die, I'II be at Ballarat Unit" he said.

Severe weather opens Port Fairy Unit early

VICSES Port Fairy Unit was very proud to announce the official opening of our new facility on 10 October 2023. Having left our former base in 2021, we were temporarily using the Country Fire Authority (CFA) Koroit and Toolong stations to house our operational equipment and fleet of vehicles.

he move to our new state-of-the-art facility is a huge boost to the unit and our members.

Maybe lesser known is the story of our unofficial opening! Wild weather swept across the southwest of Victoria on the morning of 8 September. Port Fairy Unit was in the process of handing over the Unit Controller position from Stephen McDowell to Hannah Morris, and enthusiastically preparing to move into the new facility which was to become officially operational on Monday 12 September. The weather, however, had other ideas!

With 24 requests for assistance received by 8:00am, it became apparent that this was going to be a big day. Although the new building was not yet operational, it did have a fully functional communications room. The decision was made to coordinate the weather event from there. Our first challenge was a complete lack of material (beyond the computers and building itself)! Our CFA colleagues came to the rescue with paper and pens, and we quickly worked out how to operate lights, the new kitchen, and even the computers. By 9:00am we were fully up and running.

We managed 65 requests for assistance over the course of the day, including substantial storm damage, trees down and many trampoline frisbees (who doesn't love those!). Crews were delighted to have a dry, warm, comfortable space to be fed and watered between jobs.

After the last jobs were cleared and a hot cuppa was made by 8:00pm, we toasted to a rather dramatic, unofficial building launch and the bright future of the Port Fairy Unit. The new facility was then officially opened on Saturday 10 October. ■

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



using dental floss or string, the manual ring cutter, and the powered ring cutter. We use a variety of things like drains, mesh, and rings to make sure everyone gets a go and is comfortable with using the provided tools.

These nights are very important to our members as they can assist other emergency services and community members in some very upsetting situations.

It's also a good way to ensure that all the equipment is in perfect working order.



A bright future ahead for Corryong Unit

A picturesque town located in the foothills of the Australian Alps, Corryong is a small agricultural community with a rich rural heritage. With approximately 1,300 tight-knit residents, the town's SES membership began to decline from the effects of the 2019-20 bushfires and COVID-19 isolation.

collowing the resignation of the long serving VICSES Corryong Unit Controller and Deputy Controller, the future of the unit became uncertain, and plans were put in place to review response sustainability into the future.

The recruitment drive was initially scheduled just for the month of May, with a series of intensive recruitment activities. This included unit members and regional staff attending the local farmers market, hosting the local trivia night (which booked out), several static displays outside the local IGA and visiting businesses in town, all in hopes of getting locals to attend a unit open night. The Corryong Courier supported with several front-page articles, and Sandra Moon from ABC Goulburn Murray with a radio interview.

After all these efforts to engage and inspire the local community, not a single new member walked through the door during our open night. The Unit Support Team and Corryong members were extremely deflated, but we were not deterred! Still concerned for the community and the future of the service, plan B – a community meeting, was activated.

With the support of other Corryong Emergency Service representatives, the community meeting explored what the absence of an SES response would mean for the community and to the other response agencies. After some great discussion and exploration, to our absolute delight, 21 membership applications were received.

We are overjoyed to see the VICSES Corryong Unit go from strength to strength and continue serving their community in times of need. Residents of the Upper Murray have really shown their resilience and spirit during this time, their commitment to ensuring their friends, family and neighbours remain safe with local response is a testament to their strength and will be vital to their often-isolated community.

A severe weather warning was issued on 2 October 2023 for damaging winds and heavy rainfall for most of north-east Victoria.

his event saw significant rainfall totalling over 200mm in the highcountry flow down and impact the Wangaratta community, with Ovens and King Rivers predicted to reach major flooding. A proactive approach by Hume Region staff was taken and a call was put out across the state for volunteers to assist.

Thankfully, only moderate flooding occurred, with the Ovens River peaking at 12.62m which saw water up to Yogi's eyes. During this event, the Wangaratta Unit received 16 requests for assistance for trees down and building damage.

For those unfamiliar with the Wangaratta area, Yogi is our official flood gauge located on the banks of the Ovens River in Apex Park. Community and VICSES continually monitor water levels surrounding Yogi to assess flooding situations, and the Bureau of Meteorology use him in official warnings! Our local unit even have t-shirts promoting us as 'Yogi's Heros'.

We were grateful for the support of other volunteers across the state from VICSES Ballarat, Bannockburn, Chiltern, Fawkner, Mansfield, Myrtleford, Numurkah, Rutherglen, South Barwon and Whittlesea Units as well as Shepparton Search and Rescue, who came and helped local volunteers with anticipated impacts.

Yogi was in safe hands, and we appreciate the support other units contributed. ■

is set to continue with annual visits from Monash medical students, and will continue to develop and share the knowledge, training, and work of our regional and rural volunteers.







Electric vehicle training night at Pakenham Unit

The Melbourne Electric Vehicle (EV) Show was held in September - one of the largest consumer EV shows in the southern hemisphere.

n the Sunday morning of the expo before doors opened to the public, various industry specialists were treated with a special tour around the exhibits by Emma and Dan from EVFireSafe. It was decided at a local level that we should do some specific EV training due to our high number of road crash rescue events annually.

After a few phone calls to local units, it was deemed that this topic was of great interest to rescue units around. The evening was a huge success with people coming from across the region to expand their EV knowledge and learn best practices when encountering them during emergency events, such as fires and vehicle incidents.

Attendees learnt about battery construction, scene and vehicle approach, specific safety practices, battery thermal runaway, the disabling of high and low voltage systems, as well as many of the 'no-cut zones' which are more specific to EVs rather than regular internal combustion engines.

Some of the essential things that rescuers were taught to look out for specifically with EVs was the identification of EVs, some of the many types of high voltage battery immobilizers such as pull fuses, cut loops and manual service disconnects, and the different non-standard locations that manufacturers place them.

Rescuers were encouraged to use the Moditech Crash Recovery System (CRS) and the ANCAP apps as part of their rescue plans to help identify EV components and no-go zones.

The evening hosted a multitude of EVs including BYD, Hyundai, Kia, MG, Polestar, and Tesla. Rod from PT Rescue also came down to showcase the latest in state-of-the-art extrication equipment including some newly introduced resources specific to EVs.

Our surrounding neighbours who attended included VICSES Emerald and Frankston Units, FRV Pakenham Station 93, Langwarrin CFA, Loch CFA, and Nar Nar Goon CFA. It was a great night with VICSES members, fire services, rescuers, and EV car owners all going away having learnt a great deal.

Patient transport along the George Bass Coastal Walk

The walk winds for seven kilometers along the coast, with the unsealed path often slippery and uneven. Great work to all involved!



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
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

VICSES Swan Hill Unit a 'second family' for refugee Rohullah Hussaini

Rohullah Hussaini speaks five languages and takes pride in being a liaison between emergency services and Hazara refugees in his hometown of Swan Hill, as a member of the VICSES Swan Hill Unit.

ohullah fled Afghanistan and reached Australia by boat in 2012, spending time in detention in Darwin and Perth, before moving to Swan Hill in 2013.

He has been a member of the VICSES Swan Hill Unit since 2016, a town home to migrant communities from Fiji, India, Indonesia, Malaysia and Sri Lanka. When floods devastated the region last year, Rohullah worked through Christmas and the New Year to provide flood assistance and information to the local refugee community. "This is a second family" he told SBS News in a recent interview.

"With this limbo life I've been through for 11 years, waiting to get a permanent visa, if I didn't have the SES around me, I might not be here right now."

VICSES Swan Hill Unit Controller Damian Howison remembers the first night Rohullah showed up to volunteer. "He introduced himself and said he was keen to be involved" Damian said.

"I think everyone took a liking to him. He had that larrikinism about him, that sense of humour that everybody enjoyed, so yeah, he fit right into our unit."

While Rohullah has been granted a permanent visa, he continues to wait for a visa allowing his wife and daughter to join him.

With clear blue skies, it should have been a perfect day for a skydive. However, just after 8:00am on 20 October, VICSES South Barwon Unit responded to reports of an aircraft accident in Barwon Heads.



hat was initially reported as an aircraft running off the runway, was quickly revised to an aircraft crash on the edge of Lake Connewarre near Leopold, with 17 people on board. South Barwon Unit, along with

regional staff were deployed. Recognising there may be access issues, the unit sent a 4x4 twin cab ute in addition to their rescue appliance, with additional 4x4 capacity provided by responding staff.

Using vehicles and a mule, volunteers assisted paramedics with patient care and transportation to awaiting air ambulance helicopters and an ambulance staging area. VICSES crews also assisted police in managing the scene.

"This incident demonstrated the close working relationship VICSES has with our partner agencies in what was a significant multi-agency response," said VICSES Regional Agency Commander Chris Longmore.

"Early calls on resource needs and a strong focus by crews on patient care resulted in innovative solutions to ensure a timely transfer to hospital. It is a credit to everyone involved and really reinforces the 'We Work As One' mantra."

A fantastic effort by everyone involved in responding to this event. ■

It takes a special kind of person to put themselves at risk to help someone else. That's exactly what you guys & girls did for me on Sunday. I know it was no easy feat to assemble a team to safely effect my rescue and I thank you from the bottom of my heart. It was great to see your teamwork and the obvious concern you had for each other during this precarious operation. I was left with no doubt that Stawell and Ararat have an amazing, strong community spirit which is really the backbone of our country. 

Launch of the Volunteer Leadership Program

The rumblings are true! The People, Culture and Development (PCD) team are excited to announce that the Volunteer Leadership Development Program is ready to roll out.

n response to requests for more leadership training from our volunteer leaders, the PCD team consulted with volunteers in 2022 to identify the key knowledge, skills, and abilities needed to be a successful volunteer leader.

Excitingly, in December 2022 we piloted the first version of the Volunteer Leadership Development Program with 17 leaders from 16 different units across the state. Thanks to the feedback from those leaders, a second updated program was piloted in July and August 2023 with the Frankston, Glen Eira, Greater Dandenong, Hastings, Monash, Moorabbin, Narre Warren and Port Phillip Units. Both pilots received highly positive feedback, with 100% of leaders agreeing that the materials were useful and that they will apply the knowledge gained in the future.

Fast forward to today, we have finalised a tailored and unique program suited for our volunteer leaders that is based around the framework of 'Leading Self, Leading Others, and Leading Teams'. This two-day program with a half-day follow-up group coaching session is designed to cultivate the development of flexible and emotionally intelligent leaders, who can support and promote the wellbeing of their unit members.

As part of the program, participants engage in activities, learn leadership theory and effective communication frameworks, construct targeted action plans, and take practical skills back to their units and members. Topics include building self-awareness, succession planning, the power of language, supporting member welfare and performance, and conflict management. Facilitated by our own VICSES consultants who have tangible industry experience and leadership expertise, the Volunteer Leadership Development Program looks to provide a new lens for learning and continuous up-skilling of volunteer leaders across the service.

Launch of the national Physical Fitness for Role Program

In September we officially launched the Physical Fitness for Role Program, a nationally agreed approach across all SES agencies to ensure our members have the minimum level of fitness that is required to safely undertake their operational activities.



he Physical Fitness for Role Program is a joint initiative between the Australian Council of SES, the Australasian Fire and Emergency Service Authorities Council, Natural Hazards Research Australia, Human Performance Science, the National SES Volunteer Association, and SES agencies in every state and territory.

We want our people to be safe and return home well after training and every call-out they attend, every day.

The program has developed minimum physical fitness assessments for the following 13 agreed national skill sets:



There are nine activities that assess physical fitness across the 13 national skill sets, including:

- 1. Lift and shift
- 2. Haul
- 3. Power swim and rescue
- 4. Carry
- 5. Hold
- 6. In-water safety
- 7. Ladder climb and lift
- 8. Drag
- 9. Hike

Importantly, the physical fitness assessments don't require members to be athletes to complete them. If you're able to lift equipment and move tree branches today, it's very likely you'll be able to perform the assessments.

Implementation of the program in Victoria has already commenced, with volunteers from our Bright, Essendon, Footscray and Myrtleford Units participating in evaluating our roll-out approach.



New Community Resilience Coordinator: Layton Miller

The role of a Community Resilience Coordinator (CRC) is often a misunderstood one.

ost volunteers know that the CRC position is one of four staff roles that make up a Unit Support Team (UST), but what many don't fully understand is what a CRC can do for a unit and the communities they serve.

Layton Miller is a CRC for the Loddon Mallee Region, based out of the Bendigo Office. While he may be one of the newest CRCs to join the VICSES cohort, his experience in this space spans many years. We asked him a few questions...

What do you see as the role of a CRC?

The way I see it, my role ultimately supports the end user, this being the community.

My role has many facets, from supporting units with recruitment campaigns, to volunteer retention, training and support of unit Community Engagement Facilitators (CEFs), supporting units and VICSES with community engagement programs,



reviewing and creating Local Flood Guides, media campaigns, and being an active support to units in our area. The CRC role is what you make it!

What makes a good CRC?

The individual. You must have a passion for the community and helping others. I have worked in several community engagement roles in emergency services for a number of years, and I have seen firsthand the results of engagement with the community both at events and in declared operational activities.

How does a CRC provide support to units?

The CRC role directly supports units in recruiting and retention of volunteers so that they are sustainable into the future. We also support unit engagement activities, as well as training and guidance for unit CEFs. We listen, and guide units going forward in both an operational and non-operational capacity.

How does a CRC support the community?

The CRC role supports the community in awareness, preparation and planning for emergency situations that may occur in their local area, as well as advice and guidance to the travelling community.

What is your favourite thing about being a CRC?

Being part of the UST that supports the Loddon Region and being able to have an impact on the safety of the community, as well as seeing the actions and results of my work. We all play a part in supporting one another. Community matters (pardon the pun)! ■

We asked Rachael White, a volunteer from the VICSES Sunbury Unit, about her time as a Community Engagement Facilitator (CEF).

What do you like most about being a CEF?

I like having the option of being able to go out on jobs as well as organising community visits, market stalls and demonstrations. Some of my favourite community engagement events include Bunnings BBQ's, Good Friday Appeals, primary school visits, fundraising, tin rattles, and most recently the Sunbury Halloween Spookfest!

What learnings did you gain from doing the CEF course?

I learnt how to appropriately communicate with adults. When I took on the role as a CEF I was only 19, so learning how to communicate with an older demographic has helped me better understand their needs when it comes to emergency preparedness.

How do you think the community benefits from having CEFs?

think the community is more prepared and has more knowledge and understanding about VICSES because we actively engage with them. The more CEFs we have, the more people in brange we see out and about in the community discussing emergency preparedness that directly benefits them.

What would you say to a member that was contemplating undertaking the CEF course?

100% do it! The CEF course takes you through all the steps needed to undertake community engagement, and it's hands-on. In terms of the CEF role, at the start I was scared that I couldn't be professional enough and that people wouldn't take me seriously. But the more I engaged with the community, the more confident I became.



Keeping the media informed:

A day in the life of an **SMDO**

t's 6:01am and the phone rings. An eager journalist is on the line poised with questions about a severe weather event. "How many calls for help did you receive overnight?" "How high is the river expected to peak?" "Can we set up an interview with a VICSES spokesperson for 6:40am on ABC News Breakfast?"

Managing media enquiries is a big part of the role of State Media Duty Officer (SMDO). A team of SMDOs are rostered every day of the year. We respond to incoming calls from reporters, journalists, or producers for information. In addition to drafting attributable statements, social media posts, and key messaging, we arrange interviews, and coach VICSES spokespeople.

During large-scale emergencies, the State Control Centre can be activated with the SMDO line diverted to the centre, and requests for interviews with the VICSES State Duty Officer, State Agency Commander, or State Response Controller come rushing in. The SMDO can add value to the action messages the public are receiving, by working in tandem with media to complement public information and warnings.

The role of the SMDO is dynamic. Providing on-call media support for VICSES Duty Officers and keeping the media informed enables our agency to work towards achieving safer communities, together.

Tips for staying safe online

In today's digital age, the internet has become an integral part of our lives. While it brings convenience and opportunities, it also comes with certain risks.

To help you navigate the online world safely, here are some simple tips to follow:

- Use strong, unique passwords for your online accounts. Combine letters, numbers, and special characters, and avoid using easily guessable information like birthdays or names.
- Consider using a **password manager to keep track of your passwords** securely.
- Enable **two-factor authentication** whenever possible. It adds an extra layer of security by requiring a code from your phone or email in addition to your password.
