

MESSAGE FROM THE MINISTER FOR EMERGENCY SERVICES

The Victorian Budget 2018-19 delivers a number of funding initiatives for the Victoria State Emergency Service (VICSES).

Several units will benefit from funding to support building upgrades or land purchases, as part of the Victorian Government's investment of more than \$43 million in VICSES, Country Fire Authority and Life Saving Victoria facilities.

Essendon SES has received \$1.2 million to expand its existing headquarters in Aberfeldie. This will provide volunteers with the space they need to store their equipment and respond quickly to call outs. Wonthaggi SES and Cobram SES, meanwhile, have each been provided \$2 million to purchase land for new unit headquarters and commence preparations for new builds.

These two units are struggling to attract volunteers, due to the poor condition of their current buildings. This funding will enable new sites to be located for modern, fit-forpurpose facilities, which will attract volunteers and raise the profile of the units in their respective communities.

The Budget also funded a \$10 million state-wide volunteer support package, providing training and development grants for volunteers in our emergency service organisations.



These grants will provide local volunteers with the things they need to keep their local club, unit or brigade sustainable. They will also help provide volunteer groups with the equipment, facility improvements and training they need to continue serving their communities.

These Budget commitments follow the historic Memorandum of Understanding signed in December, under which the government will fund the buildingmaintenance costs for all VICSES units that are offered long-term leases by their local council.

I'd also like to remind VICSES volunteers that applications for the 2018-19 round of the Volunteer Emergency Services Equipment Program (VESEP) have opened. Under the VESEP, the government matches every \$1 paid by volunteer groups with a \$2 co-contribution. I am delighted to announce that in 2018-19, the government is increasing its maximum contribution from \$100,000 to \$150,000.

I thank VICSES and its dedicated crew of volunteers for your wonderful service to the Victorian community. The government's funding support in 2018-19 is designed to give you the facilities and equipment you need to continue keeping communities safe.

Lastly, the 2018-19 State Budget was announced on 1 May. A \$2 million budget commitment will allow VICSES to secure land for a new purpose-built Unit for Wonthaggi. Essendon Unit also received a budget commitment of \$1.2 million to go towards upgrading their VICSES headquarters. FAQs about the MOU

On 20 December 2017 Minister for Emergency Services James Merlino visited the Narre Warren Unit to sign a new Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the Victorian Government, VICSES and the Municipal Association of Victoria (MAV).

his new funding arrangement was an important milestone for VICSES and will take significant pressure off SES units in the future, providing certainty to our volunteers. Read the following frequently asked questions to understand how the MOU will benefit your unit.

What does the MOU provide for?

The MOU provides long term security of tenure for VICSES units operating on council-owned land. Based on the MOU. the MAV will now provide VICSES units with long-term leases on a 'peppercorn' or minimal rent (\$1 per annum plus GST), in return for the State Government assuming responsibility for operational and maintenance funding of VICSES volunteer units (including volunteer unit facility maintenance).

The agreement also covers the full contribution of unit subsidies by the State Government.

Why did this happen?

The MOU replaces the previous funding arrangements which were never formally documented or signed back in 1989.

What does the signing of the MOU mean for your unit?

For units occupying council freehold property, the MOU provides the peace of mind of longterm leases. It also guarantees funding to cover operational costs for facilities and ensures that maintenance funding will also be available.

Will units still have access to additional funding?

Units still have access to grants from local and state governments, based on application. Likewise, VESEP grants are also expected to continue into the future and VICSES units are encouraged to apply.

VICSES is very appreciative that some councils have previously provided and may continue to provide financial or other in kind support to VICSES volunteer units.

The State Government provided ongoing funding to VICSES in the 2017-18 State Budget for the matching unit subsidy previously paid for by Councils. From 1 July 2017 Councils are no longer required to pay the matching unit subsidy.

What is being done to implement the MOU?

VICSES is currently working with the State Government to secure operational and maintenance funding for volunteer units so that the MOU can be implemented.



State Controllers Seminar -East & West

Some included interactive workshops and new expo stalls, aiming to provide members with the opportunity to connect face-to-face with the business across a number of new initiatives and programs.

Members were also presented with unit satchels to take back to their teams, containing new collateral, such as public information and hazards warnings posters, VICSES hazards key messages, VICSES consultation briefing booklet, Training Portal information, and much more. For those units not in attendance, unit satchels are being distributed by your Regional Managers as a priority.



Community Connectedness Strategy

Central Region has developed a targeted strategy for community connectedness based on engaging 'hotspot' areas. Spread across the region, these areas have been subject to flooding in the past and require further targeted community engagement.

rolling program of engaging five hotspots per year is under development for the Central Region Business Plan. The strategy will use a targeted approach to engage with different groups:

• Essential infrastructure providers will be liased with through Emergency Management Victoria (EMV), Department of Environment, Land Water and Planning (DELWP), Department of Economic Development Jobs, Transport and Resources (DEDJTR), Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) , Department of Education and Training, and other relevant authorities.

- Culturally and Linguistically Diverse and Koori communities will be engaged through community leaders, beginning with those identified by the Victorian Multicultural Commission.
- Residents will be engaged using the Community Engagement for Disaster Risk Reduction (CEDRR) methodology which is being developed by Melbourne University. This cutting edge approach combines conversations with residents, an app for collecting data and social marketing principles to drive household emergency preparedness.

Identifying the areas for engagement and developing a plan to engage them effectively on a large scale will be supported by information collected from a range of sources.

The engagement plans are well underway, with Community Resilience Coordinator, Malvina Tsecoutanis, working tirelessly to coordinate these activities to help drive the project and key initiatives planned. ■

- Pamper yourself every now and again because you deserve it





Training included using basic communications equipment, identifying and using ropes, chains and slings, using ladders and hand tools, lifting and lowering techniques, and identifying and using fire extinguishers. Activities were undertaken with safety and first aid applied to each scenario. Horsham Unit Controller and Trainer Jarrod McLean said that even the Trainers and Assessors learnt valuable skills during the weekend. Predicted rain and wind on the Saturday evening forced a change in logistics for the night, which included packing up and storing equipment. Although challenging, it was also seen as an opportunity to teach members safe and timely site equipment management.

The highlight of the weekend was the presentation of the Ian Mayberry Award, presented annually in memory of emergency service member, leader and inspiration Ian Mayberry. This year's award was presented to Ballarat Unit member Jordan Bush for his eagerness to learn and willingness to volunteer over the duration of the weekend. 

FERP Project

FERPs will provide units with a valuable tool to gather local flood intelligence for use during operations. FERPs will bring together knowledge from Municipal Flood Emergency Plan (MFEPs), Flood Zoom, information on local impacts, and most importantly will lay out trigger-based actions and considerations.

Alpine Search & Survival

For many years VICSES has supported Victoria Police and Ambulance Victoria search and rescue efforts in Victoria's High Country.

n 2005 VICSES was called to assist with a search for a missing plane near Mt Hotham in heavy snowfall. It was evident at the time that although there were many willing to respond, members were under resourced and lacked alpine training. Soon after the Alpine Search and Survival (ASAS) program was developed, providing stringent fitness and training requirements.

Volunteers from the East, Central and North East Regions are those called to assist in extreme Victorian Alpine conditions. A common ASAS incident location is Mount Feathertop, the second highest peak in the Australian Alpines. While helicopter recovery is preferred to foot crews, casualties are often in locations inaccessible to aircraft due to low cloud coverage and strong winds at such a high altitude.

Recently, the Bright Unit assisted Ambulance Victoria to retrieve a teenager with a suspected ankle fracture on Razorback Ridge, located between Mt Hotham and Mt Feathertop. Due to low cloud, aircraft was unable to be used. Instead, two VICSES ASAS members, alongside specially trained wilderness paramedics, covered the distance on foot, walking 11km to the destination and arriving around 11:30pm. The team spent the night with the casualty, waiting for enough cloud to clear to allow for aircraft retrieval the next morning. ■





Up ahead, a hiker had fallen down a steep cliff face, sustaining head and suspected chest, and abdominal injuries. Rachel, an off duty paramedic, was quick to treat the hiker with first aid. Emergency services soon arrived, including the VICSES Bannockburn Unit. The hiker was loaded into a helicopter and transported to the Alfred hospital, and the Bannockburn Unit members accompanied the hikers' family back down the hiking trail.



The Bannockburn members turned up as expected very quickly. They did a very competent and professional job as part of the emergency services team on location, backing up the paramedics and police and working well as a team."

Terang to the Rescue – literally!

The weekend of 17 – 19 March saw devastating fires and storms sweep across the South West, followed by peat fires that smouldered for weeks. Over this weekend South West received 389 requests for assistance, and all 24 units in the region were active.





Our members worked tirelessly to help their communities get back on their feet, and the support is ongoing. Special thanks to Terang, Hamilton, Cobden, Camperdown, Port Campbell, Mortlake, Port Fairy, Warrnambool and Colac Units for their amazing efforts and contribution.

Bruce Moore, Deputy Controller for the Terang Unit, describes the weekend from the perspective of Terang members.

"It started with our first call on Saturday night at 2100 hours. On arrival at Garvoc we saw a wall of fire reflected off the dark sky to the north around 'The Sisters,' and it really was a sobering sight. Some way off in the distance, a fresh north-westerly was blowing the fire front our way.

We had cleared two large trees and a few minor ones from across the highway when we received an emergency call to help a woman trapped in her caravan. However, as we sped to the rescue, we saw the fire had jumped the main A1 highway, and we headed back to Terang through a haze of smoke. After successfully freeing the woman, we proceeded to Noorat to clear a very large tree that was completely blocking the road. Looking towards the west, we could see a "ring of fire" stretching from south to north. It was then we received an SMS indicating it was "too late to evacuate Terang and to seek shelter". This really reinforced the potential danger for our community.

Years ago we had wired the local headquarters (LHQ) with an external generator to provide power in the event of a blackout in Terang. Thanks to this generator, we now became the "beacon of light" in an extremely dark township, where the only other light source was the red glow in the sky surrounding the town. With Terang plunged into darkness, 33 staff and residents from the May Noonan Aged Care Centre were evacuated to our LHQ. Mattresses from the centre were laid out on the floor and the elderly residents slept while we remained on standby pending further evacuation advice. We monitored the Vic Emergency website to follow the progression of the fires as the winds were now severe, moving the fire towards Terang. CFA teams came from all around to assist, working long and hard. Our sincere appreciation goes out to them. While we were out attending to our jobs, it was reassuring to know that CFA teams were out doing theirs. They did a marvellous job and saved many homes, out-buildings, livestock and other property."



From 2100 brs Saturday to Sunday afternoon we bad completed 38 calls. Basically I tbink we were all working on adrenalin, just doing whatever needed to be done."

The workshop demonstrated to regional staff the latest rescue equipment and extrication techniques, equipping them with the skills and knowledge to go on to train and support volunteers.

The RCR workshop will become an annual event allowing for better engagement, learning and development opportunities with our Regional Trainers to further enhance service delivery to our units. The year ahead will also see the introduction of the Road Rescue Support training package, Road Rescue Support dispatch arrangements into Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD), equipment lists for Principal and Support providers and a focus on seeking out and communicating approaches on new car technologies. These initiatives will ensure that VICSES remains leaders in RCR.

MSDS Online - Compliance Management System


An eLearning training package covering essential Material Safety Data Sheet (MSDS) online knowledge is now available on the Hub. SDS Online is a web based compliance application for hazardous substance registration and is applicable to those who manage hazardous chemical storage and purchasing at each unit. Business rule 2.3.5 of the VICSES Work Health and Safety Play Your Part Manual states MSDS Online is to be used by each unit to register their hazardous material inventory and storage areas. The package is video based and takes about 20 minutes to complete, covering essential knowledge such as log in, system navigation, and data input. ■

Workplace Inspections

How safe is your unit?

Regular workplace inspections are essential in helping to prevent injuries, ensuring that you are safe to conduct training and respond to emergencies. With poor housekeeping and building maintenance being a common cause of workplace injury, take some time at training to identify potential hazards and how to remedy them.

CHECK OUT THE FOLLOWING:

- Building layout: Are your exits clear? Is your equipment stored correctly? Is your signage effective and clearly displayed?
- General housekeeping: Look for potential trip hazards such as cracked or uneven floors, or incorrectly stored equipment. Are bins emptied regularly? Has clutter been cleared? Is equipment tagged and tested and in good working order?

WHAT SHOULD **I DO?**

The safety of your unit is everyone's responsibility. Keep your eyes open for anything that could potentially cause harm to you or your colleagues and address the hazard straight away. Even a small amount of water on the floor can be a major hazard if it isn't cleaned up straight away. Incorporate a workplace inspection into your schedule every six months.
