What's in the Box?

Theme: Emergency Kit

In this story, the key message is that Emergency Kits are needed for severe weather preparation. The list of items (provided by the SES) is a checklist that can help guard against most situations. Trev and Amy turn gathering the items into a scavenger hunt that makes it more enjoyable, Trev outlines how important it is that every item is ticked off. If they were in an emergency situation, they would not want to miss out on essentials. Amy agrees and suggests that they get Mum and Dad to double check their list.

What students will 'Know and Do':

Students will know what to have in an Emergency Kit and will share the information with parents

- 1. View the Li'L Safety Club Natural Disasters advertisement Emergency Kit
- 2. Ask students to:
 - list as many items as they can remember that makes up the Emergency Kit
 - work with a partner to check their lists and add anything they may have forgotten
 - watch the advertisement again and tick the items as they see them.
- 3. As a class, discuss the importance of having an Emergency Kit and why each item is needed.
- 4. Distribute **Student Activity Sheet 3A**. Ask students to select the correct items listed in the advertisement and draw a picture of that item. Another option is to ask students to find the images (newspapers, magazines, catalogues, etc) and paste them into the box with the correct name. Students then cut out the images and paste them into the Emergency Kit. Once complete, students take the page home to share and discuss with parents.

And/or

- 5. Play the memory game: Find five examples around your school of objects listed in the Emergency Kit and place them on a table under a cover. Give students only 10 seconds to see the objects and then ask them to name each of them.
- 6. You can vary the game by asking students to close their eyes while you remove or add another item. Students then need to identify the changed item.

* An Emergency Kit should be made from a box that is lightweight, waterproof (e.g. plastic) and easy to identify. For more information see 'Useful resources'.


